

"Circuit breaker definitely caught all of us off-guard, most scrambling to get the equipment required for work-from-home and basic necessities as we transit into the month with no clear directions in sight. Amidst the worries and anxiety during this time of global uncertainty, we began to worry about our trainees as we went on weeks without the routine weekly physical interactions with them.



Initially, the idea of carrying out volunteering virtually impossible seemed and almost pointless due to the lack of human touch and physical interactions. The session felt first itself awkward as we were all adjusting to communicate virtually and we had little to no idea on how to engage through them tiny our webcams."

COVID-19 does not stop us from engaging our trainees

"2020 was indeed a challenging year for us due to COVID-19, but that did not stop us from engaging our trainees. The pandemic taught us to try out new things that we didn't think would work, like having a hybrid ACID and conducting virtual sessions. During the circuit breaker, we took our volunteering sessions online. Initially, we were afraid that the responses would not be forthcoming. To our surprise, we managed to get some responses from them. Even though there were a few hiccups in the beginning, both the trainees and volunteers eventually managed to ease into the virtual sessions. We are glad that we have since been able to resume physical sessions, and reestablish the physical interactions between trainees and volunteers.

"Unlike previous years, ACID 2020 was uniquely different, given that stringent safe management measures had to be put in place due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead of gathering at a single location, participating MINDS MYG Projects were assigned to four different schools and centres, and some even participated from home. To ensure the safety of our volunteers and trainees, safe management measures (e.g. safe entry, travel declaration, temperature taking) were adhered to, and everyone was segregated into pre-assigned groups to limit socializing.

The session kicked off with sing-along and dance, much to our trainees' delight. Themed "Into the Future", trainees then participated in activities and games that encapsulated space travel and exploration. Trainees who were unable to be present at the respective centres, were given home-kits and were engaged virtually. Shortly after, dinner was served, followed by screening of movie clips. ACID finally ended with the much-awaited Disco Night, where everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves."


